Newcastle City Council will contribute \$10,504 towards the

The main purpose of the grant is to ease the unemployment  
situation and to complete the run of annual grants from  
1951 to date. Some persons have received temporary  
employment. The majority continue to receive benefits  
and of course for those who are not on benefits the  
Index to the Australian Newspaper has been a great  
benefit.

Appointments of the Library staff have been made  
and the assistance to be received from the  
State Library of New South Wales has been arranged by  
senior librarians of the staff of the Public Library.  
Interest in the project has been high and the  
work continues.
