6. Business Arising from the Minutes 6.1 Recognition of the 20th Anniversary of the Guraki Committee R Russell advised the event is currently scheduled for 7 November 2019 at the Newcastle Museum. L Eastwood provided an update and proposed that the event be a cocktail function to open it up to other guests, to better use the space, and exhibit past works of Guraki. L Russell & C Kitchener <p>6.2 Mulubinba: Aboriginal name for Newcastle</p> <p>L Eastwood advised that the NSW Geographical Names Board (GNB) contacted CN seeking clarification of the status for the proposal to formally gazette the place name Mulubinba. The question to the Committee is to seek a determination as to the prospect of an application being submitted to GNB.</p> <p><i>Discussion by Members</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Previous discussions have raised issue with dual names, its processes, the language, and the spelling used for sites. Although contentious, this is an opportunity to move forward as well as to resolve some of those issues. • Important that words are written the way they sound to enable the public to look and pronounce a word as it should be said. • Traditional accurate information must also be paramount in this process. In this sense, recognising that the modern application of Mulubinba as the name for Newcastle is incorrect. Traditionally, the word mulubinba referred to a place on the south side of the harbour that had many sea ferns - a specific location and one that does not spread across the Newcastle City domain. • Who are the people with the right understanding and knowledge of language? Who has the authority to make decisions about language? How do those people differ from 'the experts'? Identify and work with them, and survey community with the information gathered so those in the community who can value add to the process have the opportunity and information to do so. • Guraki and Council need to invest time, resources, and education to fully comprehend the impact of our words and the context in which they are being applied. Need to focus on working in partnership with people who are known to have the knowledge to provide that information in the correct context. CN to translate those findings into its core strategies and policies. • L Russell will continue to work on the meaning of the eight dual names. Miromaa to be a first point reference for local language. • Some confusion between what a dual name is and what a place name is. Need to ensure that these elements are clearly articulated to negate this misunderstanding within CN and the community. Guraki to work with CN to develop better comms around our messaging, and to review cultural information on CN website. • Members to consider if there are place names the Committee may want to pursue in the future. 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<p>satisfied that the information holds to the cultural narrative of place and location take the steps to formalise the naming through GNB. Guraki to determine the cultural framework and processes to follow. <p>7. Items</p> <p>7.1 Aboriginal Acknowledgement – Council Website</p> <p>C Johnson informed that the concern regarding information on CN website is more about the context in which it is being used by community groups - in particular, the business sector. The reality is that CN is seen as a reliable source, and therefore businesses use CN information as a given accurate record. Most businesses are unaware of the CN context in which the information is applied i.e. even though we are meeting on a place – we are also meeting for all constituents within the LGA boundaries.</p> <p>Businesses are stating that their meetings take place on the lands of the Awabakal and Worimi. Basically, this statement is incorrect. To address the matter CN could advise on its website that CN LGA boundaries cover Awabakal and Worimi lands – adding a statement that Awabakal lands are south of the Hunter River and Worimi lands are to the north of the Hunter River. This may resolve the matter. CN should also look to reviewing and ensuring that the Aboriginal content on its digital platform is presented in a context that is cultural appropriate, accurate and respectful.</p> <p>7.2 Development Application process - Flag Poles</p> <p>C Johnson is seeking assistance to streamline and reduce financial costs for educational centres that wish to install flagpoles. Predominantly pre-schools and long day care centres that have a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP). As part of the RAP objectives those centres are wanting to put up multiple flagpoles to fly three flags as an action of respect.</p> <p>Centres need to consider planning standards and instruments (i.e. SEPP). Putting in more than one flagpole triggers a requirement for a DA. CN has duty officers who can walk people through the process, and information is available on CN website. Each case is reviewed individually. Centres may need to think through and rationalise why they believe there should be three flagpoles as it may not be necessary to have all three flagpoles. It would be cost and resource effective to install one flagpole.</p> <p>In the interim could CN design a fact sheet that says if you are looking at doing flagpoles here is the step by step process you need to follow?</p>	<p>C Johnson Member</p> <p>B Smith and L Eastwood to review CN website and suggest changes to the word format.
