  - How best to engage youth LSPS is about 2040 so need the next generation engaged?

#### APPENDIX 1 - LIVEABLE CITIES - DISCUSSION POINTS

- Crisis of modern cities lack of transport, poor people move out due to unaffordability
- Newcastle has become more liveable but rapid growth will erode liveability
- Legacy aspect decisions now will impact Newcastle's liveability in 50 years' time eg.
   Preservation of open space and public domain
- What decisions are we making now for it to be a liveable city in 50 years
- Recent positives for Newcastle Bathers Way, Harbour Foreshore, Light Rail, proximity, affordable (relative to Sydney), good jobs, accessible, more food and recreation and shopping options
- Need to get the foundations right roads and movement (hardware), buildings and their relationship to spaces, digital era (how do we add software ie. Smart City)
- Collaboration and partnerships important lack of and working together, need cohesion and common goals
- Inclusion is important University of Newcastle has made a great contribution to the City by bringing students into the centre
- Aged care struggle in City as they are put on the fringes
- Public transport needs to be where people are
- Liveable for whom? No singular notion. Includes residents and business and visitors and workers.
- Urbanism build our liveability out of the distinctiveness of our place (not bring models in from elsewhere)
- We are different from other Cities
- Proximity to other places around the City quite easy
- Housing affordability
- Post-industrial, mining, steel city possibilities
- Water lots around the City
- Lack of street trees and awnings in summer
- Using the existing, older building stock in CBD more options to bring into play
- Liveable City = alive
- Only concentrating on City what about the outer suburbs
- Outer suburbs very viable and people wanting to live there eg. Beresfield, Waratah. Need to make them liveable, town centres
- Building controls are they an enabler or disabler of a liveable city? Eg. DCP and SEPP 65.
