From Monday 1 February 2016, we will be centralising many of our incoming call lines to our Customer Contact Centre.

The contact centre will be the first port of call for enquiries relating to waste services, tree management, road and infrastructure projects, parks and ovals, regulatory services, rates, parking, cemeteries and more.

We will be:

- continuing to provide face to face service at our City Administration Centre, 282 King Street, Newcastle
- now taking calls from 7am to 6pm

- expanding the range of services that can be resolved at first contact
- having fewer points of contact for a more consistent, efficient and professional customer response
- improving our capability to track the progress of individual customer contacts using call recording and a new request management system
- responding to customer requests received by email and mail
- throughout 2016 there will be more changes as we continue to provide even better service to the community.

DO YOU LIVE IN WALLSEND?

YOUR RATES AT WORK PLAYGROUNDS

Visitors to Lambton Park and Webb Park in Mayfield will be pleased to find two great new play spaces. We recently added a toddler play area to the playground at Lambton and replaced the old equipment at Mayfield with new play structures. Lyall Reserve, Shortland and Nesca Park Newcastle are up next - both will have their playgrounds replaced before the end of June.

ROADS

King Street, Newcastle

Stage two of King Street's footpath rehabilitation project is expected to resume in February 2016 and will see the completion of the Brown to Perkins Street sections. This project involves replacing deteriorated footpath, kerb and gutter on the southern side of King Street between Crown and Perkins Streets.

Bibby Street, Hamilton

In 2016, we are rebuilding the road and footpath in Bibby Street, Hamilton between Samdon Street and Graham Road. As part of this project, we are removing existing trees and replanting on the southern side, constructing a wider verge and new footpath to slow traffic and provide space for new trees, installing new drainage and reconstructing the road including kerb and gutter and road resurfacing. Work is expected to begin in January and take up to six months.

Lawson Avenue, Beresfield

We are replacing the failed road pavement and resurfacing the road in Lawson Avenue between Anderson Drive and Percy Street. Works include installation of subsoil drainage for pavement protection, replacement of road pavement, kerb and gutter, school crossing and sections of concrete footpaths. The project is due for completion in April 2016. This work is funded by the Federal Government's Roads to Recovery Program.

CYCLEWAYS

We are building shared pathways and cycleways across Newcastle to improve connectivity and create viable alternatives to driving. Projects include:

Broadmeadow: Sections of shared path on the eastern side of Jackson Street

Lambton: Completion of circuit around Lambton Park

Waratah: Staged replacement of the shared pathway on Turton Road between Lambton Road and Hunter Stadium.

Kotara: A new major section of shared pathway is underway at Park Avenue between Northcott Drive and Kullaiba Road. This will provide an off-road cycling solution in a busy area and completes the connection on Park Avenue between the R4 cycleway at Kullaiba Road, Westfield Shopping Centre and the R1 cycleway at Dibbs Street/Fernleigh Track.

As part of this project Council will be undertaking road works with the upgrade of bus stops, median replacement and road realignment/resurfacing between Kullaiba Road and Lexington Parade.

ENVIRONMENT

Ironbark Creek Rehabilitation

We completed the third stage of Ironbark Creek rehabilitation works in 2015 and are set to start work on the fourth stage this year. Stage four includes the main channel of Ironbark Creek, extending from Cardiff Road to just downstream of Croudace Road, Elmore Vale. This project will:

- reduce bank erosion on site and creek bed instability upstream and downstream.
- protect public and private property.
- decrease sediment flowing downstream.
- enhance habitat for native animals.
- create a beautiful public space.

Willai Creek rehabilitation

Additional rehabilitation work in the downstream section of Willai Creek, Elmore Vale is underway and is jointly delivered by Council and Hunter Local Land Services.

SPORTSGROUNDS

We have finished building an improved sportsground amenities building at Islington Park. The work included demolishing the existing amenities block and construction of a single storey building to accommodate new change rooms, public toilets and ramp access.

Flood lighting is being installed at Lambton Park and Tarro Park which will extend hours of use available at these popular sporting fields.

Mayfield Park has had a facelift with a new wicket constructed, a field redesign and sub-soil drainage installed to improve the function of this site for users.

RECENTLY COMPLETED WORKS

Construction of a pedestrian pathway at Charlton Street, Lambton and Turner Street, Georgetown to improve pedestrian safety.

Construction of a roundabout and upgrade of pedestrian crossing at Union Street, Cooks Hill to slow traffic and improve pedestrian and vehicle safety.

Shared pathway construction at Empire Park, Bar Beach and Donald Street, Hamilton (partial construction).

A low-flow diversion bank, or berm, within Kotara Park is now complete. The berm diverts stormwater away from the road at Park Avenue and Howell Street. The capacity of the culvert at Kotara Park Bowling Club has also been upgraded to increase efficiency of stormwater discharge from the park.

Waratah Park has received a new grandstand roof and flood lighting to an outer field.

National Park Athletics Track has a new carpark and the central playing surface has been levelled.

Warabrook Park has a new shade structure, BBQ and pathway.

The installation of a gross pollutant trap is being completed in Bruce Street, Cooks Hill to prevent garbage from flowing into Cottage Creek.

The existing parking area around the memorial at Hereford Street, Stockton has been reconstructed to create a formal parking area with beach access.
