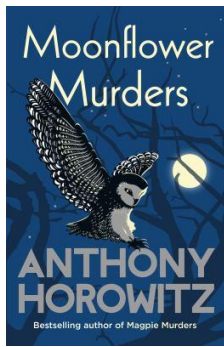


Moonflower murders by Anthony Horowitz

I love a cosy murder mystery and Anthony Horowitz is exceptional within this genre.

Moonflower Murders is the sequel to the Magpie Murders, where our unlikely detective (and former publisher) Susan Ryeland once again finds herself, and her insider knowledge, in demand.

Although not essential, I think that you will find this book much more enjoyable if you have read the first in the series. Both have a kind of 'book in a book' structure that delivers readers twice the action and intrigue of a standard mystery.

As Moonflower Murders opens, Susan is in Crete running a bed & breakfast with her partner, Andreas. Far from being the idyll of their imaginings, the work is incessant, the guests not always pleasant and it's not even particularly profitable.

So, when Susan is offered an opportunity to return to England and help a wealthy couple locate the whereabouts of their missing daughter, it provides her with a break from the trials of running a b&b and a chance to make some fast money. Little does she know...

I have really enjoyed this series so far, both books have complex plots and engaging characters. I've found them both to be really entertaining reads (actually, I think they'd be fabulous beach books too).
