A snapshot of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities in Newcastle



Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in 2021:



7,415 people identified as being Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, living in 3,954 households - **35% more** than the 2016 Census¹, although this number could be a lot higher – as not all people state whether they are Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander in the Census.

4.4% of the total population identified as being Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander (NSW=3.4%), as compared to **3.5%** in 2016.

The western parts of Newcastle LGA had the highest number of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander residents:

- **Beresfield-Taro** with 442 residents making up **8.9% of the population** in that location, as compared to 5.5% in 2016.
- Maryland with 578 residents making up 7.4% of the population, as compared to 5.7% in 2016.
- Waratah West with 226 residents making up 7.3% of the population, as compared to 4.4% in 2016.
- Wallsend with 812 residents making up 6.1% of the population, as compared to 4.9% in 2016.





The age structure of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in 2021 was heavily skewed towards younger people, compared to the total population of Newcastle²:

- Median age of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people = 25 years (NSW=23).
 37 years for the total population (NSW=39).
- 34% of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community were aged 0 to 17 years, as compared to 19% for the total population of Newcastle.
- 6% of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community were aged 65 years and over, as compared to 17% for the total population of Newcastle.



Housing costs & tenure in 2021:

- 56% of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community rented (total population = 37%)
- 41% of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander households either had a mortgage, or owned their own home (total population =61%)
- 14% of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander households lived in public housing (total population = 6%)



Employment and participation in the labour force



Workforce participation rate

for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in 2021 was 64% as compared to 61% in 2016. In NSW the participation rate for the total population was 59% in 2021 and 64% for the Newcastle LGA.

Unemployment rate for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in 2021 was **9%** as compared to 15% in 2016. In NSW and Newcastle, the unemployment rate in 2021 for the total population was 5%.



The occupations of employed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in 2021:

- 1. More 'Community and Personal Service Workers' than any other occupation (20%), as compared 13% for the total Newcastle population - an increase of 85% since 2016.
- 2. 'Professionals' = 19% (Newcastle total population = 29%)
- **3. 'Technicians and Trades Workers' = 13%** (Newcastle total population = 12%)
- 4. Proportion of 'Managers' (8%) was lower than Newcastle total population = 11% but had increased by 110% since 2016.



Education levels of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

- 13% had a Bachelor degree level or higher, compared to 28% for the total Newcastle population.
- 23% had completed a vocational qualification (Certificate III & IV Level), compared to 17% for the total Newcastle population.
- **41%** had **completed Year 12**, compared to 54% for the total Newcastle population, this is a 55% increase since 2016.

There was an increase in school attendance of **Aboriginal and Torres Strait** Islander children between 2016 to 2021.

Attendance at school education

- Preschool attendance increased by 53% since 2016.
- A larger percentage of Aboriginal and Torres Straits Islander children attended primary school (13%) as compared to the total Newcastle population (7%).
- Secondary school attendance increased by 36% since 2021.
- 84% of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 12-17 attended secondary school in 2016, compared to NSW average of 81% (general population = 92%)

In 2021, Aboriginal and **Torres Strait Islander** household income levels were similar to total household income level in Newcastle. There were some differences in personal income:

Personal income

The weekly household incomes in 2021 for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people:

of households earned a high income (\$2,500 per week or more), compared with 29% of total households in Newcastle

of households earned a low income (less than \$650 per week).

The weekly personal income in **2021 for Aboriginal and Torres** Strait Islander people:

of individuals earned a personal income of \$2,000 per week or more, compared with 14% of non-indigenous individuals

of individuals earned a personal income of \$650 or less, compared with 39% of non-Indigenous individuals.
